HOW YOU ARE MAKING A DIFFERENCE



PARTNERING WITH NGOs

In 2019, HPIC worked with Hope and Healing International to make health care affordable and accessible to people with disabilities. Thanks to the support of generous donors, HPIC provided two shipments of medicine and medical supplies to help some of the most isolated and underserved populations in the Kingdom of Eswatini. The shipments included over \$3.3 million worth of donated medicines and medical supplies, and provided treatments and medications for conditions like diabetes, asthma, hypertension, eczema and eye care.

75,245 people were impacted by this donation!

Zanele is one patient that benefited from this partnership. Zanele suffered from epiphora (excessive watering of the eye). She said, "my eye was in a bad condition, it was so painful and water would continue to pour out." As a result, she was unable to work because she could hardly see. When she arrived at the clinic, the moisture was drained from her eye and she received the medical treatment that was needed. Zenele was overjoyed and expressed, "I can do a lot more things now that I've received treatment – I can make grass mats and do a lot of things with my hands. I can also see my loved ones now. I am so thankful and I feel so fortunate that people in Canada care about me. Without them, I would continue to be sick."

SUPPORTING HUMANITARIAN MISSIONS

Every year, HPIC works with hundreds of Humanitarian partners who bring Humanitarian Medical Kits to treat children and families who do not have access to health care.

In 2019, 415 Humanitarian Medical Kits were brought to vulnerable communities. Over the last 10 years, a team of health care volunteers from Ghana Rural Integrated Development (GRID) have been travelling to Northern Ghana to offer health clinics to thousands of patients who cannot afford medical care. During their travels they met Bernard. Bernard is seven-years-old and had a massive umbilical hernia.

The protrusion coming off his abdomen was so large he could not even run. His mother brought him to three hospitals, but the surgery to repair the hernia would cost her over a year's worth of wages which she would never be able to afford. Bernard stopped attending school because the other kids bullied and beat up on him because of his condition. Bernard and his mother visited the health clinic put on by GRID and after being seen by the surgical team, he had his hernia successfully repaired and the necessary medicines he needed during his recovery.







RESPONDING TO EMERGENCIES

In 2019, over \$8 million worth of medical aid was sent around the world to respond to emergencies. A big area of focus this year was helping refugees and Internally Displaced People (IDPs) in different regions. Throughout the year, HPIC distributed medicines to hospitals, clinics and refugee camps in Iraq, Lebanon, West Bank, Gaza and Nigeria.

Maha was displaced from her home and had to relocate to Northern Iraq and was in desperate need of medicine. Maha gave birth to a healthy baby boy and contracted a urinary tract infection. After experiencing lower abdominal pain and dysuria, Maha visited the clinic in the refugee camp. With a skid of medicines sent from Canada, she was treated with amoxicillin, ibuprofen and metronidazole. When leaving the clinic, Maha was filled with joy and said, "I am thankful for the best medications that I have ever received!"

EMERGENCIES RESPONDED TO IN 2019

Cyclone Idai

Delivered over \$4.8M worth of essential medicines and medical supplies to Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Malawi, helping 213,000 people.

Hurricane Dorian

Supported International Medical Corps's emergency medical team to Grand Bahama island to provide immediate outpatient healthcare, medicine, water, sanitation and hygiene to approximately 51,000 people.

Irac

Provided over \$200,000 worth of donated medicines and medical supplies to reach refugees and Internally Displaced People (IDPs) in Iraqi Kurdistan.

Venezuela

Provided medications and medical consumables including antifungal, antibiotics, analgesics, anti-inflammatory to the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) and the Venezuelan Red Cross (VRC).



RESTORING MOTHER AND CHILD HEALTH

In 2019, HPIC trained nurses and midwives in Ghana through *Helping Babies Survive and Helping Mothers Survive*, two suites of modules developed by the American Academy of Pediatrics and Jhpiego to reduce neonatal and maternal mortality in environments with limited resources. This training is part of HPIC's Obataanpa project. Training topics included neonatal resuscitation skills, essential care during a baby's first few days of life, managing hypertensive disorders during pregnancy, stopping and preventing postpartum hemorrhaging and other maternal and newborn care techniques and life-saving practices.

Betty is a midwife at the Essuowin Health Center in the Ashanti region of Ghana and is so thankful for the training she received.

"We had a situation with a woman who was suffering from postpartum hemorrhaging. It was very severe and we could not control it. We tried massaging her uterus at first, but that did not work. In training, I had been taught to use a condom tamponade for similar situations. I tried

this and the bleeding stopped. At that moment, I was so thankful to have received training that helped me to respond to a critical situation which saved this woman's life."

HPIC has been focusing on developing local master trainers who can continue training other nurses and midwives. In order to provide a hands-on learning experience, they received donated simulators, flip charts and clinical equipment.





DELIVERING HOPE IN REMOTE COMMUNITIES

Asunka is a young woman from a rural community in the Upper East Region of Ghana. In 2019, Asunka, along with 39 other community health volunteers, were trained on iCCM (Integrated Community Case Management) – a training that empowers community health workers to provide diagnosis and treatment for common childhood illnesses, specifically pneumonia, diarrhea and malaria for children under five. This training is part of HPIC's HOPE (Health Outreach, Prevention and Education) project, a new initiative that aims to bring basic health services closer to families living in rural and remote communities.

After the training, all community health volunteers received a bicycle and a backpack filled with supplies and basic medications. With these tools, they are able to visit households, give health advice, and provide treatments to sick children of families who would otherwise have difficulty accessing health facilities.

Asunka was very excited to receive the training, the bicycle and the supplies. She expressed, "I am committed to serve my community. I am happy when I help my community. May God bless all the people who are supporting this project. I hope that one day, my community will be free of malaria."

Obataanpa Project

- Distributed backpacks filled with basic medicines and supplies for maternal and child health to equip community health nurses in their outreach activities.
- Supported the training of 139 midwives and nurses in maternal and newborn care techniques and life-saving practices.

HOPE Project

Trained, equipped and deployed 40 community health workers to bring essential health services closer to families living in rural and remote communities in northern Ghana.

LEBANON

Partnering with Anera

Delivered medications free of charge to local health care facilities on a regular basis ensuring the provision of health services to the most vulnerable amongst the refugee population.

NIGERIA

Supporting Sr. Daniela Gottwald Health Center

Provided primary care kits, equipment and gynecological supplies to the health center in southwestern Nigeria, allowing the facility to offer free treatments to those who have nowhere else to turn.

KENYA

Pamoja Project

Provided over 34,000 medical treatments to pregnant women, mothers and children in some of the poorest and remotest areas of Kenya.
