A NOTE FROM HPIC'S PRESIDENT

Breakthrough. Adaptability. Resilience. These are the words that best describe HPIC's local projects and emergency responses that have taken place in the past six months.

In Ghana, under our Women's and Children's Health Program, The H.O.P.E. Project has expanded to reach more women and children in new communities with essential medicines and healthcare. In Lebanon, the A Neo-life project is actively helping the tiniest of patients - premature babies - by giving them the neonatal care and medicines they need in a critical period in their growth.

In Kenya, our Solar Suitcase Initiative project is providing reliable electricity for obstetric and newborn care to over 40,000 community members in five healthcare facilities. According to the United Nations, 17.7 million people need humanitarian aid and protection because of the war in Ukraine.¹ Through our Emergency Response Program, HPIC has already delivered over \$25 million in essential medicines to Ukraine, and millions more are on the way.

In Turkey and Syria, the latest reports indicate that the death toll from the earthquakes has surpassed 50,000 people. In Malawi, the devastation of Tropical Cyclone Freddy left thousands of people in despair while damaging critical medical infrastructure, such as hospitals. Thanks to our partners, HPIC is responding to these medical needs one shipment at a time.

These are just a few examples of countries where HPIC is currently active. There are many more. Our small and agile team has been responding to the needs of our partners and remain committed to caring for the medical needs of people who need healthcare now.

I remain inspired by our partners, donors, volunteers, and staff who have shown resilience throughout the new challenges that come our way. HPIC could not continue our ongoing commitments, local programming, and emergency responses without their support. I am grateful for our various partnerships and want to acknowledge HPIC's pharmaceutical partners for their invaluable contributions in our efforts to restore health worldwide and our local partners who are our hands and feet on the ground.

We are dedicated to improving health in the 37 countries where medicines are delivered. Our team is guided by the principles of impartiality, independence, and neutrality. HPIC provides quality healthcare to those in need, no matter who they are or where they may be.

To attend to these medical needs, HPIC has launched "The Around the World Campaign". Every dollar raised will provide medical relief to countries that make our news headlines today and those still in critical need but have been overshadowed by new emergencies.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE PROGRAM

Timely, coordinated and effective responses to crises around the world

Since 2022, HPIC has been actively working to bring medicines, medical supplies, and other health services to victims of war, natural disaster, and crises. Crises in 2022 and 2023 in Ukraine, Pakistan, Turkey and Syria have led to unprecedented emergency responses for the organization.

Turkey and Syria Earthquake

The death toll from February's earthquakes in Turkey and Syria has surpassed 50,000 people—including 45,968 confirmed deaths in Turkey and 7,259 in Syria. Millions of people across both countries have been forced into displacement camps and thousands remain in hospital because of injuries suffered. HPIC and its partners on the ground were able to quickly mobilize shipments of medicines, valued at \$350,000 CAD, to both countries impacted by the deadly earthquakes. These medicines will help provide over 25,000 treatments to those affected. HPIC continues to monitor the situation in both countries and will look for additional opportunities to support the recovery efforts if needed.

Pakistan Floods

In late 2022, over 33 million people were affected by severe flooding throughout Pakistan. An estimated 18,000 people lost their lives, and more than 2.2 million houses have been damaged or destroyed. Another 8 million people have been displaced, with approximately 1.8 million persons still exposed or living extremely close to flooded areas. HPIC responded by mobilizing and shipping over \$4 million worth of medicines and medical supplies to our partners on the ground. The bulk of these medicines and medical supplies went to hospitals and health facilities in the Baluchistan and Sindh provinces of Pakistan, provinces that were among the hardest hit by flooding. We remain dedicated to assist those still devastated by the flood, as we continue to work with our partners to provide medical assistance and other basic needs to the people of Pakistan.

Malawi's Tropical Cyclone Freddy

Tropical Cyclone Freddy has affected 500,000 people. An estimated 510 people have lost their lives, and over 363,000 people are now displaced. The devastation has caused health facilities to be destroyed or flooded, leaving communities without adequate access to health services. As well, the cyclone has exposed major health risks in Malawi and southern African countries. As this situation brought so much despair to many, HPIC officially responded by mobilizing the first 6000 treatments to treat approximately 3000 wounded and displaced victims. While providing medical aid to those affected by Tropical Cyclone Freddy, HPIC is also developing an emergency response to Malawi's deadly Cholera outbreak by building a shipment of medicines to treat Cholera.

Continued War in Ukraine

HPIC continues to work with Canadian and international partners to respond to the urgent medical needs of people in Ukraine and those IDP's that have left to seek refuge in neighbouring countries. What started off as a \$1.5 million in medicine goal to aid people in crisis by the war, quickly surpassed our expectation. The generosity of Canadians allowed HPIC to mobilize \$25 million in medicines and medical supplies, providing treatment to the 17.7 million people in urgent need, and the 8.2 million refugees² who are displaced . The efforts of many partners have been instrumental in helping people in Ukraine. Our financial campaign remains open so that we can mobilize millions more in medicines over the next few months.

ACCESS TO MEDICINES PROGRAM Humanitarian Medical Kits (HMKs)

Going on a medical mission and want to increase access to medicine and improve health among vulnerable populations? Take a Humanitarian Medical Kit (HMK) for primary care and help a remote community stock up on essential medicines and medical supplies. HMKs for primary care include an assortment of sufficiently dated high quality primary care medicines and medical supplies donated by the Canadian healthcare industry worth approximately \$5,000+. Portable and convenient, these kits help medical mission teams create a functioning clinic anywhere from an urban centre to a remote mountain village. They are also used in emergency situations, where they are especially valued for their size and versatility. One kit provides up to 600 medical treatments.

HMKs for primary care contain products from the following categories:

- Antibiotics Analgesics Antifungals Antihypertensives
- Antimalarials Anti-inflammatories Antidiarrheals Anti-ulcer medications
- Asthma medications Topical creams Eye/ear drops and ointments

Getting Involved

The kits are designed for Canadian doctors, nurses, and healthcare workers providing care in vulnerable communities. Volunteers, NGOs, humanitarian organizations, churches, and faith-based organizations can obtain these kits according to the eligibility criteria. There are people who take these kits to use them, while others deliver these kits as a gift of health and hope.

Obtaining an HMK

For primary care, fill out the application form and send it to kits@hpicanada.ca at least 6 weeks prior to the date of departure.

For specialized care, fill out the application form along with a needs list and send them to kits@hpicanada.ca at least 8 weeks prior to the date of departure.

- 1) Verify custom procedures for medicines in your destination country.
- 2) HPIC requests a tax-deductible donation of \$650 per primary care kit to cover part of the costs of running this program.



HMK CARRIER FEATURE Getting medicines to Cuba

Reverend Canon Brian McVitty and his wife, Mrs. Diane McVitty, were able to take over 100 pounds of medicines and medical supplies within four Humanitarian Medical Kits (HMKs) to their church partner in Cuba. The medicine and medical supplies were delivered to Dr. Lisandra Navarro, who was in tears of joy and disbelief upon seeing the donated medicines. She expressed that pharmacies' shelves have been emptied, with patients having to bring their own medical supplies (i.e., antibiotics, bandages, et al.) to be admitted at the hospital for surgery. She added, "Doctors at the hospital don't even have surgical gloves."

WHAT'S NEW

Women's and Children's Health Program: Neo-Life Project is saving lives in Lebanon

In Lebanon, 18,000 Lebanese and refugee infants are born prematurely every year (9.6% of total deliveries) and need to be admitted to the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). To support the healthcare needs and increase access to treatment for Lebanese and refugee infants who have been born prematurely, HPIC has collaborated with the non-governmental organization, American Near East Refugee Aid (ANERA), to launch the "A Neo-Life" project.

Through this project HPIC and local partner ANERA are working to improve preterm birth prevention and care by supplying essential medications such as IV nutrition, vitamins, inotropic, and anticholinergic agents among other medicines to the Tripoli Government Hospital and the Karantina Government Hospital. These donated medicines are helping recipient hospitals save the lives of premature infants and decrease their risk of developing long-term complications.

"We are very proud to work with ANERA and provide healthcare to the tiniest and most fragile citizens in Lebanon. Both the Tripoli Government Hospital and the Karantina Government Hospital specialize in the care of premature babies, and we are confident that this aid will benefit preterm babies and give renewed hope to their families," said Lois Brown, President of Health Partners International Canada. "We want to ensure that these babies have access to the medicines that they need, and we are grateful to all the partners in this project who are supporting this initiative."

The medical needs of the people in Lebanon continue to be a priority for our team – more financial support means more medicine out the door for the tiniest of patients.

WOMEN'S AND CHILDREN'S HEALTH PROGRAM Pamoja Project in Kenya

With neonatal deaths remaining unacceptably high in Kenya, contributing to 40% of underfive mortality rates, it is also projected that 7,700 women die each year from pregnancyrelated complications. This translates to 21 women dying each day or one woman every hour from preventable or treatable causes.

Several factors prevent women and children from receiving essential healthcare during pregnancy and childbirth. To address these challenges and in collaboration with Anglican Development Services (ADS) – Kenya, our local partner, HPIC has been implementing the Pamoja (which means "together" in Swahili) project in some of the low resource communities of Kenya. The project is strengthening the existing healthcare system by enabling the health workers to provide quality services to the communities. The project also supports the health facilities with primary medicines and supplies required for serving communities in need.

HPIC believes in providing sustainable healthcare solutions to improve the mother and child health services at the facility level. This year the project aims to improve the emergency and obstetric and newborn care in five health facilities in Kakamega and Kisumu Counties in western Kenya by installing solar suitcases in these facilities.

With reduced power interruptions, the health facilities will be equipped to provide efficient and effective consultations to the community members, especially mothers and children. By powering critical obstetric lighting, mobile phones, and fetal heart rate monitors, health workers will be better equipped to provide necessary obstetric and newborn care to hundreds of mothers and babies, reducing maternal and newborn deaths. This project is helping to ensure that more women in Kenya survive childbirth!

DEDICATION BEYOND DECADES Robert's remarkable role as a CBA in Ghana's H.O.P.E Project

Robert Akurugu is one of the most experienced and oldest Community Based Agents (CBAs) working in our Health Outreach, Prevention and Education (H.O.P.E) Project in the Garu district of the Upper East Region of Ghana. He has been serving his community as a health volunteer since 1983. On the initiation of the project in 2019, Ghana's Health Services Officials nominated Robert to be the included CBA in the H.O.P.E Project. Through this project, Robert and 60 other CBAs have been trained and equipped to deliver quality healthcare services and health education to women, caregivers, and children in the community. Robert's experience and expertise have been invaluable in this regard.

Robert's efforts, along with those of other CBAs, have led to an improvement in the delivery of essential health services and an increase in the utilization of primary healthcare services for mothers, pregnant women, and children under 5. As a result, cases of childhood malaria, pneumonia, and diarrhea have decreased, leading to an overall decrease in child mortality rates in the targeted communities. Moreover, Robert and other CBAs are addressing the challenges faced by people living in remote communities, such as high costs of treatment and transportation, long travel times to the nearest health facilities, and stigma associated with certain diseases. The H.O.P.E Project equips CBAs to carry out health promotion and education services during household visits.

Working with Robert and other CBAs has enabled the H.O.P.E project to reach those who are otherwise unable to access essential healthcare services, which has been crucial to saving lives and ensuring the success of the project. Robert's dedication and commitment to his community are a shining example of how CBAs can make a real difference in improving the health and well-being of pregnant women and children under the age of 5.
